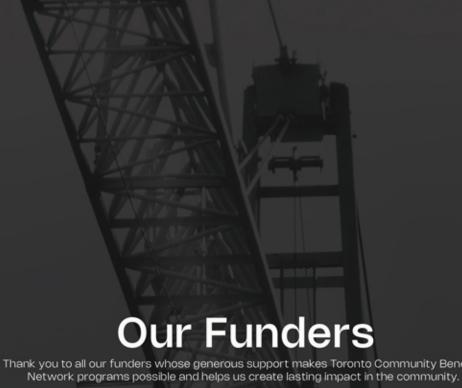

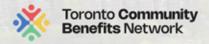

President & CEO United Way Greater Toronto

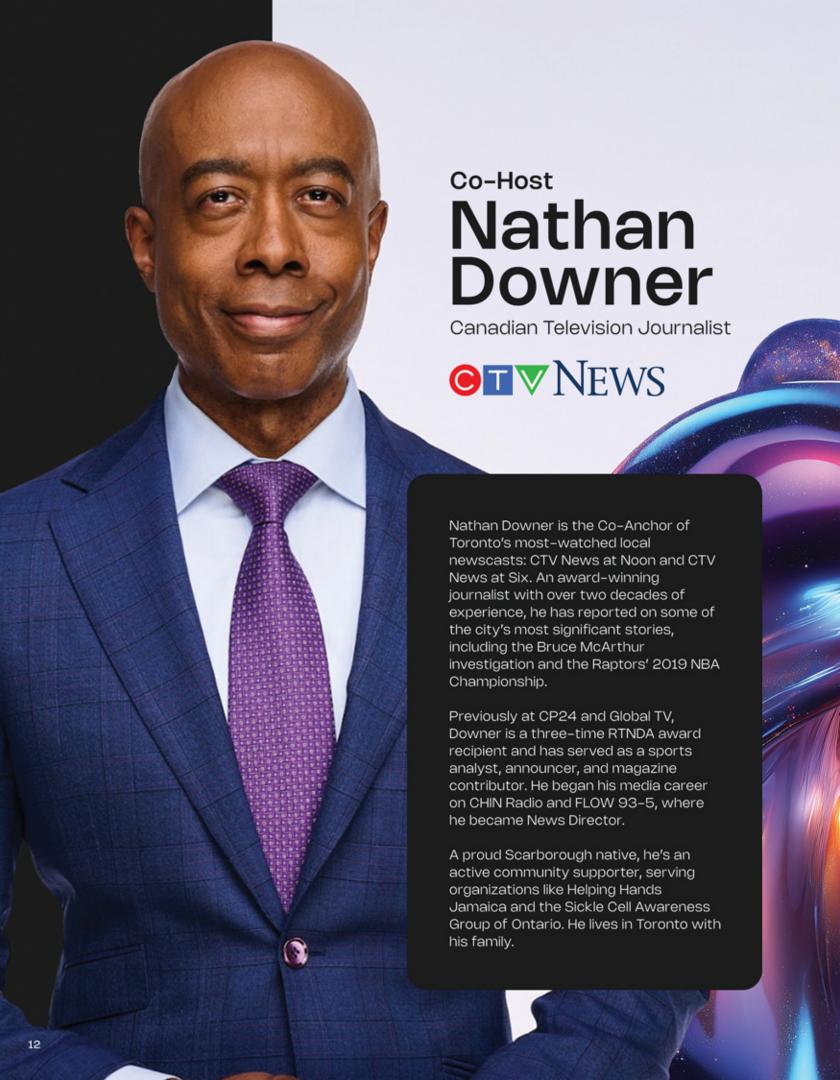

Leading on Diversity Award Community · Shortlisted Nominees

Honours a community, labour, and industry leading organisation that is making extraordinary efforts to ensure historically disadvantaged communities and equity deserving groups are accessing jobs and opportunities in construction.



Skills Ontario

Skills Ontario is deeply committed to advancing diversity, equity, and inclusion in the skilled trades and technology sectors. Beyond advocacy, they invest in workforce development initiatives prioritizing equity-deserving groups, including women, Indigenous communities, newcomers, racialized youth, and persons with disabilities.

Through inclusive programming and outreach—such as the Young Women's Initiatives, First Nations, Métis, and Inuit-focused programs, and Black Youth in Skilled Trades events—Skills Ontario ensures underrepresented youth see a future in the trades. A standout example is the Umoja Series, which supports Black youth through storytelling, mentorship, and real-world exposure to skilled trades.



A Woman's Work Support Centre

A Women's Work Support Centre (AWW) is Ontario's first trade school exclusively for women, offering free skilled trades training to address barriers faced by women from underrepresented backgrounds. Its 16-week program combines hands-on training in drywall, tiling, and framing with mentorship, mental health support, and job placements.

Since launch, AWW has enrolled over 900 women, with 150 trained and 45 placed in construction roles between 2024 and 2025. This measurable success highlights AWW's role in building a pipeline of skilled, job-ready women workers, advancing equity, and setting a new standard for community benefits in construction.



Women's Multicultural Resource and Counselling Centre

WMRCC of Durham has served the community for 32 years, originally as the only organization in the region supporting Black and racialized women. It now offers trauma-informed care and entrepreneurship programs to help immigrant and racialized women, including young women, enter skilled trades and launch cooperative businesses through its Worker Cooperative Development (WCD) initiative.

A recognized leader in DEIA and social justice, WMRCC delivers training to institutions like Toronto and Durham Regional Police, Ontario Power Generation, CMHA, hospitals, colleges, and shelters. Its work models best practices in construction-related community benefits by advancing inclusive, equity-focused workforce development and sustainable employment pathways.

Leading on Diversity Award Labour · Shortlisted Nominees Honours a community, labour, and industry leading organisation that is making extraordinary efforts to ensure historically disadvantaged communities and equity deserving groups are accessing jobs and opportunities in construction.



Canadian Union of Postal Workers

Under Jan Simpson's leadership, the Canadian Union of Postal Workers (CUPW) has advanced community benefits through policies that boost Indigenous and racialized representation at Canada Post and within the union. Their affirmative action plans and influence on employment equity policies reflect a strong commitment to inclusive hiring and systemic change.

Since Simpson's election, CUPW's national office has diversified significantly, with measurable gains in Black, Indigenous, and racialized staff, tracked by the Joint National Human Rights Advisory Committee. CUPW also supports community-based initiatives like expanding postal banking to underserved rural and Indigenous communities, promoting economic inclusion and access to essential services.



LiUNA Local 183

LiUNA Local 183 demonstrates leadership in advancing DEI in construction through its adoption of the LEAD Charter of Inclusion and Diversity, embedded in the 2022–2025 collective agreements. Representing over 70,000 members, the union aligns with community benefits goals by promoting racial and gender diversity across the industry and within local communities.

Key initiatives include the NexGen Builders Mentoring Program for Black youth and a partnership with Aecon to deliver the Women in Trades program. This program, held at the LiUNA Local 183 Training Centre, prepares women for construction careers and targets 20% female participation. These efforts highlight LiUNA Local 183's commitment to building an inclusive and equitable workforce.



Trades NL

Trades NL represents 14 building trades unions with over 14,000 skilled workers, promoting a diverse, safe, and inclusive workforce. The organization values diversity and mental health, recognizing the importance of a respectful workplace. In 2018, Trades NL established the Indigenous Skilled Trades Office (ISTO) in Happy Valley–Goose Bay, expanding in 2023 to Corner Brook and St. John's to serve more diverse communities across the province.

The ISTO has supported over 500 clients with job search skills, preparedness, and employment interventions. Its mission is to create new opportunities for Indigenous apprentices and journeypersons, increase apprenticeship completion rates, and enhance employer and union engagement to remove barriers and foster workplace support





Canadian Turner Construction Company Ltd.

Canadian Turner Construction Company Ltd. leads in embedding community benefits into infrastructure projects through measurable and inclusive practices. In 2024, 58% of its workforce is diverse, with over 50% of new hires from underrepresented groups. The Turner School of Construction Management supports minority— and women—owned businesses, while partnerships with the Afro Canadian Contractors Association and WoodGreen uplift BIPOC contractors and single mothers.

Turner fosters inclusion through employee resource groups, mentorship, and company-wide anti-racism training. Its recruitment uses bias-reducing scorecards and targets equity-seeking communities. Procurement policies prioritize diverse suppliers, and trade partners are encouraged to support equity goals. Turner's alignment of values and action sets a national benchmark for inclusive infrastructure.



Bass Installation

Bass Installation, led by Natasha Callender–Wilson and founded by Stephen Callender, exemplifies community benefits in construction through strong commitments to diversity, inclusion, and local engagement. Their DEI, Performance Management, and Human Rights policies ensure fair treatment, equity, and dignity across their workforce, reinforced by a comprehensive Employee Manual.

They engage actively in community initiatives like Build a Dream to support underrepresented groups in trades. Collaborations with the Afro Canadian Contractors Association and Toronto Community Benefits Network highlight their broader impact, while involvement in projects like the Sixteen Mile Sports Complex reflects a focus on community-oriented construction.



Tridel

Tridel's \$26.8 million commitment to community benefits in Regent Park and similar work in Alexandra Park emphasizes local hiring, training, and small business support. With over \$360,000 invested in social procurement, they prioritize diverse and social enterprises. Tridel tracks impact through recruitment analytics and employee engagement surveys, with over 90% participation.

Guided by a Multi-Year DEI Action Plan, Tridel partners with TCHC, Miziwe Biik, and the BOLT Foundation to engage underrepresented groups in construction careers. Their efforts include youth mentorship, scholarships, and Indigenous reconciliation through internships and Indigenous procurement, delivering measurable, sustainable community impact.

Amadou Ceesay

Amadou Ceesay, a Journey Carpenter with Carpenters Union Local 27 and founder of Fanatech Cladding, exemplifies community benefit in construction. In 2024, he won the Ontario Regional Siding Competition and represented his craft at the National Apprenticeship Competition. Beyond his technical excellence, Amadou has mentored over 100 apprentices, newcomers, and underrepresented individuals across the GTA, Halton, and Durham regions.

Amadou's leadership is action-driven, co-organizing Local 27's first Black History Month celebration, serving on the EDI Subcommittee, and mentoring through Sisters in the Brotherhood. His initiatives, such as mentoring at TCBN and supporting youth workshops, reflect clear, purpose-led outcomes. He has also empowered 80,000 youth in The Gambia and raised \$20,000 for humanitarian work in Jamaica. Through Fanatech, he creates inclusive job opportunities, fostering learning and growth on every job site.



Said Keyliye

Said Keyliye, a Drywall Apprentice with Local 675 Drywall Union, exemplifies community benefits in construction. He has set measurable, timebound goals, including completing Health and Safety certifications and a Project Management course by summer, and achieving his Red Seal certification by year's end. His active involvement in Health and Safety Committees demonstrates a strong commitment to workplace well-being and leadership.

Said's journey began with TCBN's Quick Start program in 2021, which launched his career despite pandemic challenges. Now a registered mentor in the NexGen program, he supports emerging tradespeople, contributing to workforce development. By promoting safe, inclusive work environments and investing in his education, Said aligns with the goal of building skilled, diverse talent in construction, making him a standout nominee for the NexGen Builders Champion Mentee Award.



Samuel Kuluuqtuq

Samuel Kuluuqtuq is a dedicated young Inuit tradesperson and a role model for builders in Nunavut. Starting as a laborer, he progressed through mentorship and formal training, completing a carpentry course at Algonquin College. He now works as an Apprentice Carpenter with NCC Development Limited in Iqaluit and is preparing for his Red Seal Exam.

Sam is passionate about mentoring Inuit youth and encouraging them to pursue trades. He values craftsmanship, sustainability, and community-based work, with knowledge of green and net-zero building. Through attainable goals, cultural relevance, and a vision for long-term impact, Sam embodies best practices in construction, making him an ideal candidate for this award.

NexGen Builders Award Mentor · Shortlisted Nominees

Brittany Anderson

Brittany Anderson, a Natural Gas Pipeline Inspector at Enbridge, is recognized for her leadership in equity and inclusion committees and outreach to underrepresented jobseekers impacted by COVID-19 and job loss. She mentors women entering the male-dominated pipeline industry, creating safe, empowering spaces for open dialogue and support. Brittany's mentorship focuses on building confidence, technical skills, leadership, and resilience.

Her efforts lead to measurable growth in mentee confidence and leadership engagement, addressing systemic barriers through individualized guidance. Through programs like TCBN's NexGen Builders, Brittany's clarity and commitment to anti-racism make her an outstanding candidate for the NexGen Builders Champion — Mentor Award.



Joel Kitaka

Joel Kitaka, a Journey Person Carpenter with Carpenters Union Local 27, is a standout mentor in construction, driving equity and systemic change. As Chair of the Equity, Diversity & Inclusion (EDI) Committee, Joel leads initiatives with measurable outcomes, like increasing Black and racialized worker representation, connecting mentees to apprenticeships, and celebrating cultural events like the union's first Black History Month. His active outreach during COVID-19 recovery supports marginalized communities.

Joel mentors through the Toronto Community Benefits Network's NexGen Program and in the workplace, fostering emotional intelligence, self-advocacy, and inclusive hiring. His "tough love" approach helps mentees overcome challenges, gain leadership roles, and mentor others, making Joel an ideal candidate for the NexGen Builders Champion — Mentor Award.



Wade Whittle

Wade Whittle, Superintendent at NCC Investment Group Inc., is a dedicated mentor focused on community-based capacity building in construction. In Gjoa Haven, a remote community of 1,350, Wade has mentored eight local trainees who recently completed pre-trades training. His leadership has set clear, time-bound goals, preparing these individuals for the Trades Entrance Exam (TEE) and apprenticeships, creating meaningful pathways into the construction sector.

Wade's mentorship goes beyond technical training—he provides consistent support, sets high expectations, and offers tough but compassionate guidance. By fostering local employment and career advancement, Wade builds confidence, purpose, and future tradespeople, making him an ideal candidate for the NexGen Builders Mentor Award.

NexGen Builders Award Employer • Shortlisted Nominees Honours exceptional mentees demonstrating strong career advancement, mentors dedicated to guiding and uplifting others, and employers who actively foster inclusive, supportive workplaces in construction.



BC Infrastructure Benefits Inc. (BCIB)

BC Infrastructure Benefits Inc. (BCIB) is advancing workforce diversity in skilled trades through its mandate under the Community Benefits Agreement (CBA). The CBA prioritizes employment for Indigenous people, women in non-traditional roles, people with disabilities, and equity-seeking groups across 15 major infrastructure projects.

BCIB sets apprentice hiring targets aligned with provincial ratios and supports apprentices through union sponsorship, structured check-ins, and priority rehiring. As of March 2025, 11% of project hours were worked by apprentices, surpassing the 10% target, and 20% of the workforce were apprentices or trainees toward a 25% goal. In 2024, a first-year electrical apprentice earned the Top Apprentice Award at the National Training Institute Tradeshow.



Building UP

Building Up sets industry-leading standards for advancing community benefits in construction. Through hands-on training and culturally relevant mentorship, it supports individuals from day one. Its alumni program offers job placement, career coaching, and networking for sustained employment. Strategic partnerships, including with LiUNA 506, create time-sensitive pathways into unionized trades careers.

Leadership development is central, with two women—one Black and one formerly incarcerated—recently promoted to managerial roles. The leadership team is 50% women, BIPOC, and LGBTQ2S+, setting a benchmark for inclusivity. Through social procurement and partnerships with other social enterprises, Building Up's impact extends beyond construction.



NCC Investment Group Inc.

NCC Investment Group Inc., a 100% Inuit-owned organization in Nunavut, models best practices in community benefits within construction. It supports Indigenous talent through financial aid, on-the-job training, exam tutoring, and childcare—removing barriers to skilled trades. Clear apprenticeship pathways and wraparound services ensure sustainable career growth.

Leadership development is a priority, with one-on-one CEO coaching helping staff advance from operations to senior roles. A young lnuit employee was recently promoted to Corporate Operations Manager. NCC also invests in local training programs, allowing community members to access skilled jobs without relocating—boosting economic opportunity and self-sufficiency in the North.

Buy Social Canada

Buy Social is a social enterprise that views procurement as a tool for achieving community social and economic goals. Since 2014, Buy Social Canada has connected purpose-driven purchasers with social value suppliers, fostering relationships that generate social benefits. Through advocacy, education, and consulting, the organization drives social procurement to create impactful opportunities across the marketplace.

Buy Social collaborates with the community, private, and public sectors to provide training, develop policies, and share resources. They offer a nationwide social enterprise certification that connects suppliers with social purchasers. With over a decade of experience in community benefits in construction, Buy Social has created a guide to help policy makers, organizers, and construction companies align projects with community objectives.



Oakwood Vaughan Community Organization

The Oakwood Vaughan Community Organization (OVCO) emerged from the Oakwood Vaughan Neighbourhood Action Partnership (OV NAP) in response to the closure and potential privatization of Vaughan Road Academy (VRA). Initially a resident-led sub-committee, OVCO transitioned into an independent organization, gaining the capacity to lead advocacy efforts, deliver services, and manage community-driven projects outside the City-sponsored initiative.

OVCO is a grassroots organization focused on uniting residents, advocating for a vibrant neighborhood, and creating a hub for local services. The organization values individual strengths, challenges systemic oppression, and supports those with fewer choices. Recognized by residents, community organizations, government, and the Toronto District School Board, OVCO leads with integrity, conducting research and championing community priorities.



The Hamilton Community Benefits Network

The Hamilton Community Benefits Network (HCBN) was created in response to opportunities presented by the Hamilton Light Rail Project and the inclusion of Community Benefit requirements in Bill 6: The Ontario Infrastructure for Jobs and Prosperity Act. Inspired by the success of the Toronto Community Benefits Network (TCBN), HCBN aims to ensure equitable opportunities for all residents to contribute to Hamilton's growth.

HCBN envisions Hamilton as an inclusive, thriving city where all residents have the opportunity to build healthy communities and a prospering economy, promoting community benefits through infrastructure projects.

Crosslinx Transit Solutions Constructors

Crosslinx Transit Solutions Constructors is a leader in delivering measurable community benefits, beginning with the Eglinton Crosstown LRT project, where it became the first contractor to embed a Community Benefits Agreement. Through its Community Benefits and Apprenticeship Program, it hired over 600 individuals from diverse backgrounds, many of whom advanced to major transit projects or earned certifications such as PEng, PMP, and LEED.

Its workforce is 30 percent women, a notable achievement in construction. CTSC partners with unions like LiUNA 506 and Local 793, and groups such as Building Up and the Toronto Community Benefits Network. It has invested 8.8 million dollars in local businesses and 1 million in social enterprises, while promoting mentorship, leadership training, and cultural inclusion.



Gordie Howe International Bridge

The Gordie Howe International Bridge project, a 7 billion dollar infrastructure initiative connecting Windsor and Detroit, sets a benchmark for community benefits with its formal Community Benefits Agreement. Scheduled for completion in fall 2025, the project incorporates industry leading standards for inclusive and sustainable impact.

Developed through engagement with equity deserving groups, the agreement ensures benefits throughout the project lifecycle. Highlights include a Community Benefits Program, quarterly public reporting, and a working group co chaired by community members. With contract clauses, dedicated funding, and strong stakeholder collaboration, the project prioritizes inclusivity, accountability, and risk management.



New Saint Paul's Hospital Development

The New St. Paul's Hospital project in Vancouver, a 2.174 billion dollar development, demonstrates how community benefits can be integrated into large scale infrastructure. Launched in 2021, it was the first to activate the City of Vancouver's Community Benefit Agreement with goals of 10 percent new hires from equity deserving groups, 10 percent local procurement, and 10 percent social procurement. By early 2023, it exceeded all targets with 48 percent new hires, 30 percent spent locally, and 16 percent directed to social enterprises.

The commitment goes beyond construction. Providence Health Care will maintain community benefit standards throughout hospital operations. Partnerships with groups like EMBERS Staffing and CleanStart Property Services have created job opportunities and supported social enterprises, showing lasting community impact.





Ticha Albino

As Human Rights Representative and lead instructor of the IBEW 353 Pathways Program, Ticha has championed access to the trades for Indigenous, racialized, and newcomer women. Since April 2022, 169 participants, including 150 women, have enrolled. Of these, 136 completed 15 weeks of training, 57 began job placements, 49 were sponsored as apprentices, and 42 are now in their first term, showing strong results in workforce integration.

Ticha also created the Bystander Intervention Train the Trainer program with Hamilton Interval House, launching May 22. This sector first initiative improves psychological safety. Her work with the Canadian Labour Congress and IBEW Minority Caucus continues to shape national labour equity strategies and policy.



Varni Tayalan

Varni Tayalan, Community Relations Specialist at Aecon, is a leader in delivering meaningful community benefits in construction. On the Finch West LRT project, her work led to 21 percent of hires meeting community targets and over 25 million dollars invested locally. She connected 46 BIPOC and equity seeking professionals to jobs and organized 120 outreach events, 60 information sessions, and 50 resume workshops.

Varni launched a first of its kind internship with the Toronto Community Benefits Network, placing 20 newcomers, 19 of whom secured permanent roles. She partnered with LiUNA Local 506 to support apprenticeship dispatches, contributing to a workforce that is 12 percent apprentices and 20 percent women. Her efforts with TRIEC and Metrolinx raise the bar for inclusive infrastructure in Canada.



Walied Khogali Ali

Walied Khogali Ali is a leading advocate for equity in Toronto's construction and urban development sectors. As Co-Chair of the Regent Park Social Development Plan, he has helped align the industry with community benefits standards. Walied led the 26.8 million dollar Community Benefits Agreement for the Regent Park Phases 4 and 5 Revitalisation Project, which includes local hiring goals for Black, Indigenous, and newcomer residents, along with mentorship and job retention support.

His leadership focuses on collaboration and measurable impact, mentoring youth and advising developers, unions, and governments on inclusive practices. His work has supported diverse workforce pipelines, job readiness strategies, and policy reforms, including advocacy for income based housing policies. Walled was awarded the Community Benefits Champion Award.

Contractors to Watch Award Ontario • Shortlisted Nominees Presented by the Afro-Canadian Contractors Association, this award honours standout emerging minority owner contractors or social enterprises from across Canada that demonstrate readiness to successfully compete for construction contracts.



Aecon-Golden Mile

The Centre for Inclusive Economic Opportunity, Golden Mile (A–GM), is a community–driven construction social enterprise in Scarborough, Ontario. Formed in July 2022 as a joint venture between Aecon Utilities (49%) and CIEO Golden Mile (51%), A–GM provides utility infrastructure services—hydrovac, traffic control, fibre optic installation, and surface restoration—with union affiliations (LiUNA 183 & 793) and projects valued up to \$1.7M.

Since launching, A-GM has hired 35 individuals—67% racialized, 38% newcomers—and paid nearly \$2 million in wages. It reinvests 51% of profits into the Greater Golden Mile, advancing community wealth-building through equitable hiring, workforce development, and local impact.



Enska

Énska, co-led by Tim Coldwell and Wes Hall, is Canada's first Indigenous real estate advisory and project governance firm. Based in Toronto, it partners with First Nations, governments, nonprofits, and investors to advance inclusive development. Rooted in the Mohawk concept of unity, Énska uses real estate to create shared value, build community wealth, and support environmental stewardship.

The company aims to impact 50,000 families through skilled trades employment. In partnership with groups like Honour the Work, Énska introduces underrepresented youth to trades. It ensures First Nations' involvement in all project phases and works with Buy Social Canada to track community benefits, setting a standard for transparency and impact in construction.



ProPlanix Consulting Group Inc.

ProPlanix Consulting Group Inc., led by Neil Lowhar, specializes in construction consulting with services in project planning, estimation, training, and design-build solutions. Known for high-quality project controls, the firm delivers detailed, resource-loaded CPM schedules using Primavera P6, Microsoft Project, and Tilos. It also implements cost control systems using Earned Value Management (EVM) to track financial performance and ensure project success.

Neil is a mentor in the NexGen Builders Mentoring Program, guiding professionals from underrepresented communities. As a Platinum Member of the Afro Canadian Contractors Association, ProPlanix supports initiatives that create opportunities for Black and racialized professionals in construction.





Chris Campbell

Chris Campbell, President of the Toronto Community Benefits Board, brings over 30 years of leadership in the Canadian construction industry with a focus on equity, mentorship, and community empowerment. As outgoing President of Carpenters' Union Local 27 and current Director of Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion at the Carpenters' Regional Council, he has created pathways for Black, Indigenous, and racialized youth. He has also served on the Coalition of Black Trade Unionists and the Toronto Police Black Community Consultative Committee.

In 2023, he launched the Chris Campbell Perseverance Award at George Brown College to support diverse students in construction. His recognitions include the 2024 Impact Award, the 2022 Bromley Lloyd Armstrong Award, and inclusion among Canada's 100 Most Influential Black Canadians in 2022. His work continues to inspire the next generation in construction.



David Galvin

David Galvin, Labour Relations Manager for Crosslinx Transit Solutions, has led efforts to embed equity, diversity, and inclusion into the Eglinton Crosstown LRT project. He developed a Community Benefits and Liaison Plan that led to the hiring of over 424 individuals from equity deserving groups, including 202 apprentices and 222 in technical, administrative, and professional roles. David partnered with unions like LiUNA Local 506 to recruit from underrepresented neighborhoods and support training and retention.

His mentorship and advocacy have helped many participants build lasting careers in construction, with impact extending to the Ontario Line and Hurontario LRT. David has built strong community partnerships, fostered cultural change within CTS, and serves as a role model for inclusive labor practices.



Judy Brooks

Judy Brooks, Manager of the Community Benefits and Supports Program at Metrolinx, has integrated community-focused strategies into large-scale transit projects, creating over 1,700 job opportunities, with many filled by BIPOC communities and women. The program has also directed \$171.2 million in economic benefits to local businesses and social enterprises.

In addition to her work at Metrolinx, Judy is a recognized leader in community and policy development, specializing in program development, organizational effectiveness, and community planning. Her work demonstrates how infrastructure projects can drive positive, lasting impacts, reflecting her commitment to social equity and community empowerment.

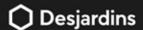










































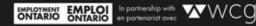
